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Rotary responds to earthquake that has devastated areas of Turkey and Syria



Turkey and Syria were struck by a devastating earthquake on 6 February that has killed tens of thousands of people, destroyed thousands of homes and other structures, and left people across the region without shelter in bitterly cold winter weather.

The Rotary world responded to this catastrophe immediately. RI President Jennifer Jones activated our disaster response efforts, communicated with the affected districts, and encouraged governors in those regions to apply for disaster response grants and share information about their relief efforts so that Rotary can amplify the calls for support.

The Rotary Foundation Trustees decided that all donations made, from now until 31 March, to the Turkey/Syria Disaster Response Fund will be used to aid earthquake relief projects through disaster response grants.


Here's how to have the greatest impact:

Give to Turkey/Syria Disaster Response Fund. Donations help clubs and districts provide aid and support rebuilding efforts where the need is greatest. The funds are distributed to affected communities through disaster response grants.

Support local initiatives. As we learn about local response efforts that are being led by clubs and districts, Rotary raises awareness about how to support them. No one objected to the postal stamp then, which was widely used for postal services in an era when India was not as modern as it is now. The stamp promoted breastfeeding and nobody batted an eyelid at the portrayal of a mother and her exposed breast on which a baby is seen suckling.

India is not the only country that issued a postal stamp to promote breastfeeding; other countries like Greece, France, Iran, Myanmar, Poland and others, both modern and conservative, also issued postal stamps for the cause.

I thank our CSR partners BHEL-GE for their generous contributions towards this.

The five member couples who hosted this fellowship left no stone unturned to keep all the members entertained. I thank the hosts-Rotarian Ranjay Goyal and Ann Anu, Rotarian Vikram Mehta and Ann Lopa, Rotarian Sanjay Kabra and Ann Kanak, Rotarian Sandeep Muntha and Ann Swati and Rotarian Sreedhar Raju and and Ann Rama Deviji.

The month of March starts with great possibilities as we partner with a Sunburn event. A DJ of international repute-Martin Garrix will be performing on fourth of March at GMR arena. This event, we are hopeful, shall generate some funds also for the club.

We have identified 15 schools where we plan to donate 745 dual desk, steel benches. This project shall cost us nearly 25 lakhs which would be totally funded again by our CSR partners, BHEL-GE.

In the month of March, we celebrate 8th of March as International women's day. We can commemorate this month for Gender Equality and Girl Child empowerment. Our work with empowering girls and women is much more than creating equity-sometimes it's about health or education. Other times it's about providing safety. 

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

An Experiment that Failed

It was on December 12, 1911 that King George V decideed to shift the British India's capital from Calcutta, now Kolkata, to Delhi, putting the city back on the world map after the fall of the Mughal Empire. Delhi was closer to the summer capital of Shimla that reminded the British officers of the cool climes of England and the 'Scottish Highlands'. The shift was successful and the Raisina Hill came to define Delhi. An earlier experiment had fallen flat. In 1327, Muhammd-bin-Tughluq moved his capital to Deogiri, renamed Daulatabad, and ordered all his subjects to move. A large number of people died in the 950-km-long journey. The plainful experience ended up enriching our vocabulary, as now all grandiose ideas that the destined to fail are called 'Tughlaqi'.

The Capital Conundrum

Knowing the capitals of countries is a game that all children play. But what happens when what you knew suddenly becomes wrong. Countries and kingdoms have disappeared from maps and great cities across the world have been renamed: London was Lodinium, Paris was Lutetia and Vienna was Vindobona to the Romans. What we call New York was originally named New Amsterdam and the city of Toronto was established as York by the British. After being renamed Petrograd and then Leningrad, St. Petersburg returned to its old nomenclature in 1991. Who can forget that 'aamchi Mumbai' was Bombay? Ho Chi Min City was Saigon and Istanbul-called Byzantium before becoming Constantinople in 336 AD-got its name in 1930.

Breast Feeding in public





A 2018 report from UNICEF states that 95% of babies worldwide are breastfed; a statistic which reinforces the fact that breastfeeding has numerous health benefits for child as well as the mother and breast milk is and will continue to be the best food for babies.

Yet breastfeeding in public is still considered a taboo and there had been and still continues to be instances of public outrage on this.

World Health Organisation recommends breastfeeding of babies for at least 6 months and laws exist around the world to protect nursing mothers. Breastfeeding in public not illegal in any countries worldwide (except few gulf nations); still breastfeeding in public remains a controversial subject and has fairly less acceptance.

WHY THE CONTROVERSY:

According to critics, the controversy could be due to the fact that the functional aspects of breasts are generally neglected and breasts are considered primarily as objects of carnal pleasures. Hence, it is considered more appropriate to do so in privacy and not in public eye.

Also breastfeeding in public is equated with women's right to exercise a bold choice which goes against the generally acceptable norm around the same making some people uncomfortable around exercising this choice.

Also according to a study it is seen more inappropriate in situations when others do not have a choice to move away from the scene like someone breastfeeding next to you on a public transport or a restaurant.

The phenomenon has been seriously criticised worldwide and there is a huge outcry over this. Very often women breastfeeding in public is subjected to humiliation, shame and disapproval. There have been instances where women were asked to leave public places like theme parks, malls and restaurants etc., because they were breastfeeding their infants in public.

The argument in favour of this is that when an infant/child is dependent on breast milk for its sustenance then he/she may ask for it whenever hungry irrespective of whether the mother is inside the house or outside at a public place. As everybody else the infant has a right to have milk (like eating in case of adults) and curb hunger.



WHAT NEXT AND HOW TO ADDRESS THIS:

August 1st till 7th is observed as "World Breastfeeding Week". Greater awareness is being created to normalise the act by aiming to protect, promote and support breastfeeding by making it less of a private moment and more of a biological function.

Awareness campaigns are necessary to create sensitisation around the subject so that there is greater acceptance for breastfeeding in public without it attracting the criticism. The same should be seen as a natural and biological function, rather a women's tactic to garner attention.

Proper infrastructure should be created to make child care rooms at easy access so that women do not have to do so publicly. Although at times child care rooms are still not easily accessible/available and women may have to breastfeed a crying child in public. Women should support other women who do so in public to make it easier for her.

There is a greater need to bridge the gap between the understanding and perception of general public towards this. People need to understand that women are restoring to this not intentionally but to fulfil the demand of the crying or hungry baby in absence of safe and secure baby care rooms at public places. People should be sensitive to this and should extend their support to such mothers instead of crying foul.

Due to the stigma associated with it coupled with the lack of societal support women are sometimes in dilemma whether to breastfeed in public or not. There have been instances in the past where various celebrities were criticised for breastfeeding in public or at workplace and/or posting a picture of breastfeeding their infant on social media. Criticism apart, the bold act by the celebrities is a positive move to try to normalise the act of breastfeeding in public, it has also encourages other moms to do so in public without giving a heed to critics.


In India celebrities like Neha Dhupia, Kareena Kapoor Khan, Lisa Haydon and Evelyn Sharma has been strong advocate of breastfeeding, although not all have done so in public. Neha Dhupia is the brain behind the social media campaign #Freedomtofeed which is a community of parents to have normal conversation about the taboo topic and try to bring some normalcy to it.

Like every taboo topic this one too is going to remain so and change can only be brought about with awareness and proper education to the growing children who are the #GenNext. Those mothers who have faced this can become a support system for those who are facing this right now. Every effort counts and it's time to break the barrier and bring about a lasting change.


Holiday's & festivals in India March Month




8 March 2023, Wednesday - Holi



The Holi Festival is celebrated as a way to welcome in spring, and also is seen as a new beginning where people can release all their inhibitions and start fresh. It is said that during the Holi Festival, the gods turn a blind eye, and it's one of the few times extremely devout Hindus allow themselves to let loose.


12 March, 2023, Sunday- Ranga Panchami



Rang Panchami is a Hindu festival celebrated on Phalguna Krushnapaksha Panchami, that is the fifth day of the second fortnight of the month of Phalguna. On the day of this festival, children in Maharashtra state play, Water fights using Water guns toys. In it they fill coloured water in it and soak eachother.



22 March, 2023, Wednesday - Chaitra Navratri, Ugadi, Gudi Padwa, Cheti Chand



It is observed during the lunar month of Chaitra (March–April). The festival is devoted to goddess Durga, whose nine forms are worshipped on nine days. The last day is also Rama Navami, the birthday of Rama. For this reason, it is also called Rama Navaratri by some people.

The Telugu and the Kannada New Year falls on the first day of the month of Chaitra (March-April). People in Andhra Pradesh and Karnataka states in the South of India believe that Lord Brahma began the creation of the universe on this auspicious day of Ugadi. People prepare for the new year by cleaning and washing their houses and buying new clothes. On the Ugadi day they decorate their houses with mango leaves and "rangoli" designs, and pray for a prosperous new year, and visit the temples to listen to the yearly calendar - "Panchangasravanam" as priests make predictions for the coming year. Ugadi is also an auspicious day to embark on any new endeavor.

In Maharashtra, the new year is celebrated as Gudhi Padwa - a festival that heralds the advent of spring (March-April). Early on the morning of the first day of the Chaitra month, people finish their ablutions, wear new clothes and decorate their houses with colorful "rangoli" patterns. A silk banner is raised and worshipped, and greetings and sweets are exchanged. People hang "gudhis" on their windows on this day to celebrate Mother Nature's bounty. A "gudi" is a decorated pole with a brass or a silver vessel placed on it.

The Sindhis celebrate Cheti Chand on their New Year day which coincides with Gudhi Padwa in Maharashtra and Ugadi in Karnataka and Andhra Pradesh. Cheti Chand falls on on the first day of the month of Chaitra, also called 'Cheti' in Sindhi. This day is observed as the birthday of Jhulelal, the patron saint of the Sindhis. On this day, Sindhis worship Varuna, the water god and observe a number of rituals followed by feasts and devotional music, such as bhajans and aartis.



24 March, 2023, Friday- Gangaur (Gauri Puja)



Women who observe Mangala Gauri fast perform the puja vidhi after taking a bath. First, the idol or image of Mangala Gauri is placed on red cloth on a wooden plate. After that, nine planets made from rice and sixteen goddesses made from wheat are drawn on the plate, where a kalash is also placed



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
