A Child's Psychological Development: Reading vs. Screen Time The way children interact with information significantly impacts their cognitive, emotional, and social

The way children interact with information significantly impacts their cognitive, emotional, and social development. While both reading and screen-based learning have their place in a child's world, the differences in their effects are profound.

Reading fosters deep cognitive engagement. It requires children to actively construct mental images, exercise imagination, and enhance comprehension skills. The process of reading stimulates brain regions associated with language processing, memory, and critical thinking. Moreover, books encourage sustained attention, patience, and empathy—qualities crucial for emotional intelligence. When children read, they enter an immersive experience where they relate to characters, develop perspectives, and cultivate their own ideas.

On the other hand, screen-based content—whether television, digital apps, or online videos—offers a more passive form of engagement. While certain educational programs can be beneficial, excessive screen exposure often leads to reduced attention spans, diminished creativity, and overstimulation. Unlike books, which encourage reflective thought, screens provide instant gratification, limiting a child's ability to engage in deep, uninterrupted focus. Additionally, excessive screen time has been linked to disrupted sleep patterns and increased anxiety due to the rapid pace and overstimulating nature of digital content.

From a social development perspective, reading encourages dialogue, as children often discuss books with parents and teachers, enhancing communication skills. In contrast, screen time can be isolating, as it rarely requires interpersonal interaction. While some digital content is designed for learning, the challenge lies in balancing passive consumption with active thinking.

In essence, while both mediums contribute to learning, reading nurtures cognitive depth and emotional richness, while screen time, if unregulated, may lead to superficial engagement and overstimulation. For a well-rounded development, it is essential to strike a balance—promoting reading as a fundamental habit while ensuring that screen exposure is intentional, educational, and limited. As we shape the future generation, it is our responsibility to guide children toward intellectual curiosity and meaningful learning experiences.





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





Rotary Youth Exchange at 50

This year, we celebrate the 50th anniversary of Rotary Youth Exchange as an official program of Rotary International. For five decades, we've enabled students to experience new cultures, develop lasting friendships, and become global citizens. We're grateful for the dedication of the Rotary members and host families who make the program possible.

If you've worked on Rotary Youth Exchange in your club or district, you've likely noticed that it takes a tremendous effort to prepare students and volunteers for an exchange and support them during it. Creating a valuable, positive experience for students hosted abroad requires time and planning by both the students and the volunteers.

What does that mean on a global scale? Since 2018, on average, we've sent and hosted 7,500 exchange students each year, and it has taken 25,000 volunteers to make it happen. When we discuss Rotary Youth Exchange, we often think only about the students' experience, but both their home and their host communities are enriched by an exchange, too. Connections and understanding are built between cultures. And the massive effort volunteers have made through the decades is part of what we celebrate this year. Why goal setting is critical

In 2021, the Rotary Club of Batavia, Illinois, USA, decided to use Club Health Check to kickstart the goalsetting process. The club's officers asked dozens of new members for their opinions and used what they learned to set goals, create a strategy, and develop an action plan. They also started holding an assembly each quarter to discuss club progress with members. The club's officers discovered that planning for several years at a time builds continuity. They also realized that goals need to be quantified. "There is a big difference between saying, 'This year, let's do some social events,' and 'This year, we are going to do six social events,'" notes Tony Winter, a past president of the club. GRANTS

2026 Programs of Scale grant application now open

The application process for the next Programs of Scale grant has started. If your club or district is involved in an evidence-based program that is ready to scale over three to five years, consider applying for the US\$2 million award. Qualified districts, Rotary clubs, and Rotaract clubs are eligible. The first step is to submit a concept note by 1 August 2025.

The Programs of Scale materials have been updated for the 2026 competition. They include details about the selection process and an explanation of the requirement that applicants collect cash contributions of at least US\$500,000 from external partners. 

World Health Day 2025 Healthy beginnings, hopeful futures



World Health Day, celebrated on 7 April 2025, will kick off a year-long campaign on maternal and newborn health. The campaign, titled Healthy beginnings, hopeful futures, will urge governments and the health community to ramp up efforts to end preventable maternal and newborn deaths, and to prioritize women's longer-term health and well-being.

WHO and partners will also share useful information to support healthy pregnancies and births, and better postnatal health.

Helping every woman and baby survive and thrive


This task is critical. Tragically, based on currently published estimates, close to 300 000 women lose their life due to pregnancy or childbirth each year, while over 2 million babies die in their first month of life and around 2 million more are stillborn. That's roughly 1 preventable death every 7 seconds.

Based on current trends, a staggering 4 out of 5 countries are off track to meet targets for improving maternal survival by 2030. 1 in 3 will fail to meet targets for reducing newborn deaths.

Listening to women and supporting families

Women and families everywhere need high quality care that supports them physically and emotionally, before, during and after birth.

Health systems must evolve to manage the many health issues that impact maternal and newborn health. These not only include direct obstetric complications but also mental health conditions, noncommunicable diseases and family planning.





World Chagas Disease Day



14 April is World Chagas Disease

Chagas disease, also known as "silent or silenced disease", affects mainly poor people without access to health care or people without a political voice. The disease progresses slowly and often shows an asymptomatic clinical course. Without treatment, Chagas disease can lead to severe cardiac and digestive alterations and become fatal. Raising awareness of the disease is essential to improve the rates of early treatment and cure, together with the interruption of its transmission.

The World Chagas Disease Day was celebrated for the first time in 2020.

In 2024 we are shining a spotlight on Chagas disease, the suffering it causes and are calling for equitable access to health care and services for everyone affected by the disease.

The theme for 2024 is Tackling Chagas disease: detect early and care for life, to increase public awareness of Chagas disease and secure greater funding and support for early diagnosis and life-long, comprehensive follow-up care initiatives.

Chagas disease is prevalent among poor populations of continental Latin America but is increasingly being detected in other countries and continents.

It is often termed as a "silent and silenced disease" as the infected majority have no symptoms or extremely mild symptom. There are approximately 6-7 million people infected with Chagas disease worldwide, with 12,000 deaths, every year.




