Part 1 - The Curious Traveller-Rediscover Wonder

Travel begins with curiosity. Learn how asking questions instead of following guide books leads to unforgettable experiences, authentic friendships and hidden gems.

“Travel is not measured only in kilometres. It is measured in how much we notice.”

It may happen while wandering down an unfamiliar street.

It may happen when a stranger smiles and starts a conversation.

It may happen over a meal whose name you cannot pronounce.

Or simply when you stop following the itinerary and ask yourself:

“I wonder what’s around that corner?”

That, for me, is where travel really begins.

Having travelled to more than 65 countries—and still counting—I have learnt that the most memorable journeys are *rarely* the ones where everything goes according to plan.

The photographs that remain with me are often not of the world's most famous monuments, but of unexpected encounters: a conversation with a stranger, a village discovered by chance, a local market, a child's smile, an unusual meal, or an ordinary street suddenly transformed by evening light.

Curiosity is the greatest travel companion.

A guidebook can tell you where to go. Curiosity tells you “why you should stop”.

LOOK BEYOND THE POSTCARD

Every destination has its postcard.

The famous monument. The spectacular skyline. The iconic landscape.

Of course, these places deserve to be seen. But a country is much larger than its famous landmarks.

Walk a little further.

Take the local train.

Visit the neighbourhood market.

Sit in a café without checking your phone.

Ask someone what they would recommend—not what the tourist brochure recommends.

You may discover that the real character of a destination begins where the sightseeing checklist ends.

I have found that some of the best travel experiences begin with a very simple question:

“What is this?”

And then another “Why?”

That second question can take you surprisingly far.

TRAVEL IS A CONVERSATION

One of the great gifts of travel is discovering that people everywhere have stories. We may speak different languages. We may eat different food, follow different traditions and have completely different daily routines.

But sit across a table from someone and the differences often become smaller.

We talk about our families.

Our children.

Our work.

Our dreams.

Our worries.

Our favourite food.

And suddenly the world becomes a little less foreign.

For me, this is also where travel connects naturally with Rotary.

Rotary's emphasis on friendship, fellowship, service and international understanding is not something that belongs only in meeting rooms.

Travel puts those ideals into practice.

You don't necessarily need a conference hall to build international understanding.

Sometimes a conversation on a railway platform is enough.

There is a moment in every journey when the tourist disappears and the traveller appears.

Wonderful as all this technology is, there is one thing it cannot provide: "surprise."

And surprise is one of travel's greatest pleasures.

The person who becomes a friend even though you expected to speak for only five minutes.
These moments cannot always be booked.
They have to be discovered.

YOU DON'T NEED TO TRAVEL OVERSEAS

Perhaps the most important thing I would say to anyone reading this is:

Take your family somewhere you've always postponed.

Drive without rushing.

Talk to someone whose life is different from yours.

Taste something unfamiliar.

Ask questions.

Be curious.

There is a moment in every journey when the tourist disappears and the traveller appears.

THE WORLD IS WAITING

We live in an extraordinary time.

Never before has so much of the world been accessible to so many people.

And yet it is remarkably easy to remain inside our own little bubbles.

Travel breaks that bubble.

It reminds us that our way of doing things is not the only way.

It makes us more adaptable.

More observant.

Sometimes more patient.

And, hopefully, more understanding.

After more than 65 countries, I still feel that I have barely begun.

There are more roads to take.

More people to meet.

More cultures to understand.

More photographs waiting to be made.

More questions to ask.

And that, perhaps, is the real secret of being a traveller: "Never stop being curious."

Because the moment we stop wondering about the world, we stop discovering it.

So pack the bag. Leave some space in the itinerary. Take the road less travelled.

In continuation with the theme of Rotary International (RI), **“CREATE LASTING IMPACT”** this month my attention is on highlighting the efforts by Government of India for reintroduction of cheetah in India in a unique “Cheetah reintroduction programme” which is still at the nascent stage.

India has been home to cheetahs and these cats graced the Indian soil until early 50s when they got completely wiped up due to overhunting.

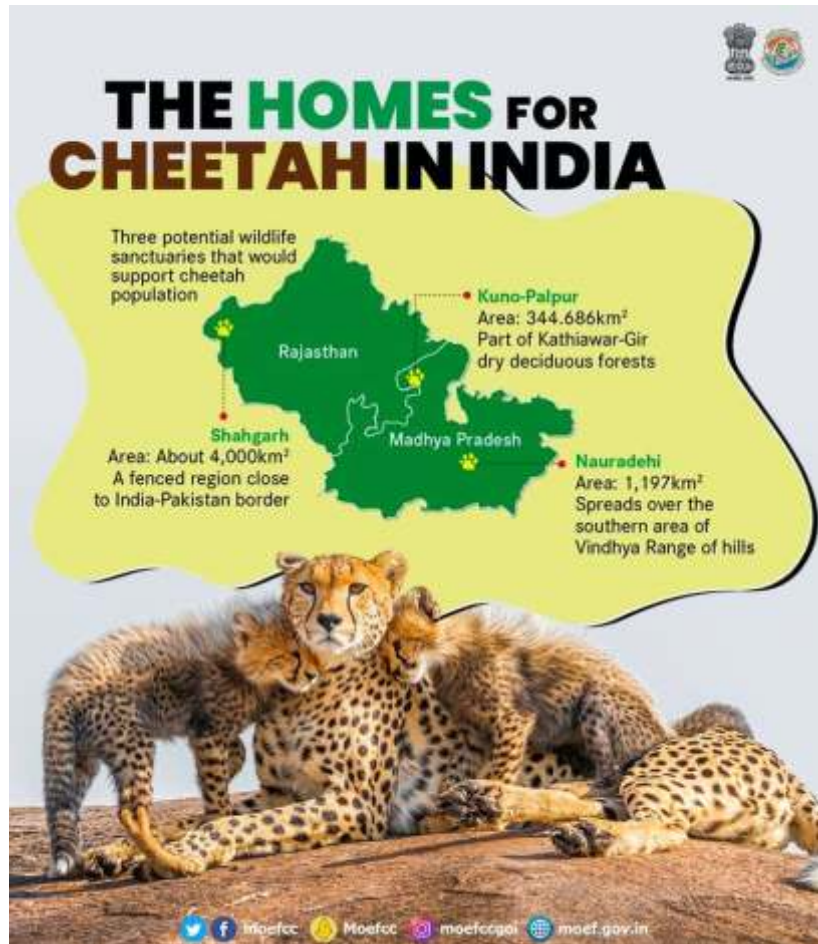
The plan to reintroduce the cheetah was underway for many decades but has taken shape until very recently.

In this article I explore the plan, its success so far and the future of it from the lens of the conservationists who holds the reins of it.

I have closely followed the project since its inception and I pray for its success.

Hope you enjoy this conservation story.

Project Cheetah aims at relocating the African cheetah to India in a collaborative effort of Government of India and Namibia's Cheetah Conservation Foundation (CCF). Cheetah is the only extinct of all the big cats found in India, which completely got extinct in 1952 due to over-hunting. India has embarked on this ambitious project to restore its lost living heritage in the form of African Cheetah.



When the project was considered, Kuno National Park (KNP) in Madhya Pradesh was considered the best site for bringing in the cheetahs. It was rated and ranked high for a number of reasons like:

1. The forest area comprises of open woodlands, open grasslands, dry deciduous forests and evergreen riverine forest, making it suitable for the cheetahs of Africa by having them the similar habitat they move in from.
2. KNP is spread over the area of 784 sq. kms and is part of larger Sheopur-Shivpuri dry deciduous forest which is very huge.
3. According to the survey and research, given the resources in the park it has potential to support cheetahs.
4. Prey base is good. It has in abundance, a variety of antelopes like chital, sambhar, nilgai, Chinkara and blackbuck to name a few.
5. The climatic conditions are similar to that of Africa considering the hot summers, adequate rains and cool winters.
6. There is historical evidence that cheetahs once existed in this forest in the past hence could survive and sustain again.
7. Right now this park is only having leopards amongst big cats. There was a tiger that strayed from Ranthambore National Park but it has returned back. So there is enough ground for establishing territories for cheetahs without conflict from other cats.
8. There is no human settlements/interference in the park as against many other parks in the country.



Subsequently, 12 more cheetahs from South Africa were translocated to India in February, 2023 adding to the existing population. The cheetahs have bred on Indian soil and are procreating. Currently their numbers have risen to around 50 including the Indian born cubs. There are plans to reintroduce more cheetahs from Africa in phased manner.

It is a giant step to undertake a project of this enormity which involves huge financial costs, the success of which could not be predicted soon. The success of the project depends on multiple factors and is difficult to predict now. Researchers say that it is only by the end of five years from inception that the success/failure could be judged. Based upon the success of this project there are plans to replicate the same at other locations in India. **Until then let's stay hopeful for a new era to dawn, a new star to shine and a new hope to emerge.**

ADOPT A PROJECT, DON'T JUST DO A PROJECT.

Doing a project is temporary.
Adopting a project is a commitment.

If we are able to see money as an enabler, which simply means giving a chance at possibilities; and we are able to comprehend what we aspire for - social status, acceptance from peers, freedom, protection, safety, etc., - we would be less judgemental and diss ourselves and others less over being consumed by it.

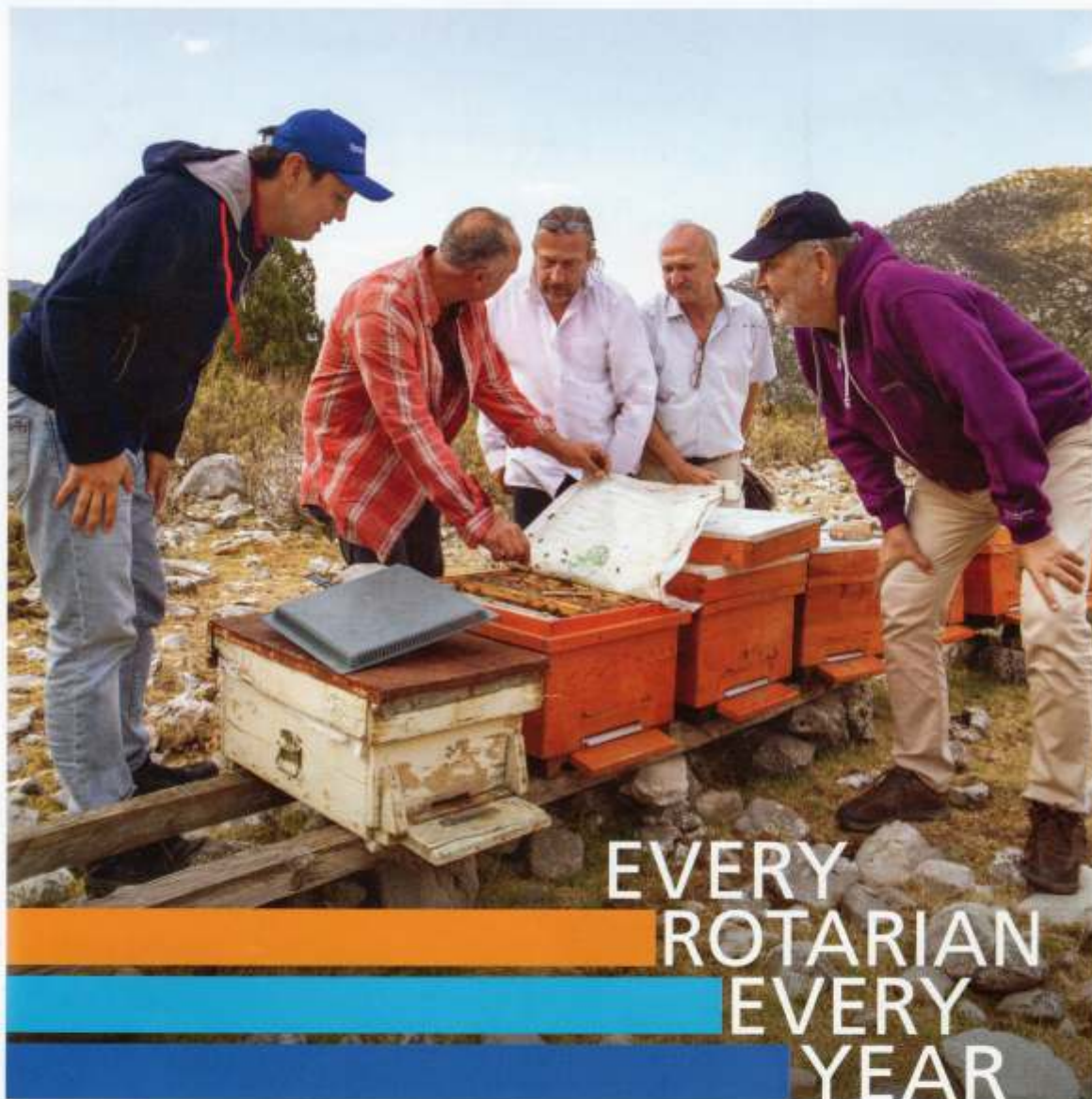
