

RI Presidents Important Message regarding Polio Eradication



Dear fellow Rotarians,

I'm writing to all of you to clarify some recent press reports that mischaracterized a recent meeting hosted by Dr. Margaret Chan, Director- General of the World Health Organization, as a debate on whether to continue the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

I, along with past RI President James Lacy and Trustee Robert Scott, attended this meeting at which we

heard Dr. Chan speak powerfully in support of polio eradication. In her opening remarks, she stated that anything other than eradication was unacceptable. She also let it be known that a different way of doing business was required in order to achieve a polio-free world.

These major stake holders reaffirmed their commitment as the overwhelming financial and human benefits of eradication were presented and supported by an independent Harvard study,

which indicated that the economic benefits to the United States alone will exceed US\$180 billion this century with the total cost of eradication estimated at US\$5 billion. All agreed to improve the quality of vaccination campaigns in the four endemic countries (Afghanistan, India, Pakistan and Nigeria), and to mobilize the necessary funds to complete polio eradication.

Proposed International Project by Rotaractors



Rtn. Krzysztof Milczarek, President of the Rotary Club of Poznan Puszczykowo, District 2230, Poland along with his daughter Agnieszka Milczarek, who is also the Secretary of the Rotaract Club of Poznan were invited by Rtn. Rajesh to visit Hyderabad in the last month of 2006.

While visiting Hyderabad they had also visited The Rotaract Club of Aurora Degree College and had interaction with the President Sakshi Biyani and discussed the possibilities of Joint Projects.

As a direct result of these interactions The Rotaract Club of Poznan proposes to hold an auction for Indian pieces of Art. These pieces of art will include paintings, drawings and handicraft based on Indian culture. Rotaract Club of Aurora Degree College would be collecting these art pieces and sending them to Poland. The proceeds from this auction would be send back to Rotaract Club of Aurora Degree College to be used to buy furniture and school equipment for deserving schools in Hyderabad.

This project would be a great learning experience for both the Rotaract clubs while also economically benefitting. Hopefully it would also start a lot more international interactions of this nature.

Defluoridation project will complete Two years

Annual function of Zillah Parishad High School, Peddakandukur, was held on 10th March, 2007. The village Sarpanch invited Mr.Amarnath Gupta as the Chief Guest.

There was lot of praise and recognition for the Rotary Club of Sunrise Secunderabad for the water defluoridation plant. The water is being supplied to the villagers with the support of Premier Explosives Limited at a nominal cost of Rs.50/- per month, per family in 20 liters can per day. Our project will be completing TWO years on the 26th June. Now the villagers are getting safe drinking water and hope to see a floristsfree village in the near future. In this event, Mr. Gupta has also announced scholarships to the Best Students. The scholarships are in addition to the

cost of uniform and books for academic year. Premier Explosives Limited also extended their support to help the school by paying salary for two teachers which was appreciated by all.

3rd - Visit to Pushpagiri Eye Institute, Marredpally

The members were briefed about the facilities available at the institute and also the trends and developments in the field of eye care. The institute is already rendering community service by tying up with organizations including Rotary clubs.

6th - Direct Taxes/Union Budget 2007

They were recommending the Equity linked Insurance policies as they had the benefit of insurance plus the increase in capital worth plus the relief in Income Tax. There was lot of interaction specially between Narender, Mudit and the speakers on the pros and cons of equity linked policies.

24th - Business Meet

Plans for the following month were discussed and the members were keen to visit ISB. Vaman said he would coordinate and plan the visit. The president elect Rtn. Ravindarnath was very keen on finalizing his team for the coming year. All these discussion were carried out with Buffet Breakfast at Hotel Taj Tristar.

Fresh Fish.

The Japanese have always loved fresh fish. But the waters close to Japan have not held many fish for decades. So to feed the Japanese population, fishing boats got bigger and went farther than ever. The farther the fishermen went, the longer it took to bring in the fish. If the return trip took more than a few days, the fish were not fresh. The Japanese did not like the taste. To solve this problem, fishing companies installed freezers on their boats.

They would catch the fish and freeze them at sea. Freezers allowed the boats to go farther and stay longer. However, the Japanese could taste the difference between fresh and frozen and they did not like frozen fish.
